take your blank with you.	Litter Respect the outdoors by leaving your campsite as you found it.	leave your blank burning all night.	Campfire This is a serious fire hazard. Any naked flames should be monitored at all times.
practice pitching and striking tents before your blank.	Camping trip (or camp, or trip) Practicing pitching and striking will help you find the best and quickest methods. You'll be more confident in your camping abilities, and it's also a chance to check that you have everything you need.	make lots of blank when everyone has gone to sleep.	Noise It's important to think about other campers and make sure everyone gets the good night's sleep they deserve.
use high visibility guy lines or mark them with blank.	Flags Guy lines are a major trip hazard, so let other people know they're there – and remind yourself too.	play sword-fighting with your tent blank.	Poles This can injure yourself and others, and it can damage your equipment too.
get familiar with your blank.	Campsite It's important to be aware of any potential hazards, such as rivers or ponds. You also need to know where the exit is case you need to evacuate and of course, find the toilet too!	pitch tents blank.	Too close together Aim to pitch tents at least six meters apart to avoid the risk of fire spreading.

always place your tent bag down blank.	Flat Resting your tent bag on its end can damage the poles.	use a hairdryer to dry your tent before packing it away if it's blank.	Wet It's best to pack your tent away when it is dry; however, you should never attempt to dry your tent with an unnatural heat source as this can affect the fabric.
blank and pack away your tent carefully.	Fold Storing tents correctly means they're less likely to get damaged.	use a wooden mallet to hammer in blank pegs.	Metal You should use a wooden mallet for wooden pegs, and a rubber mallet for metal pegs.
tie guy lines up by folding it into blank, and then tie the whole bundle in an overhand knot.	Thirds When you next unpack your guy lines, this will make sure they come out straight and unknotted.	blank guy lines too much.	Tighten You should tighten your guy lines regularly to avoid sagging; but be careful not to place them under excess tension.
scrape dirt and soil from blank before packing them away.	Pegs Cleaning your equipment is crucial when striking your tent, so that everything is kept in good condition.	pitch a blank tent by yourself.	Patrol A patrol tent, which is the traditional Scout tent, needs at least three people to pitch it.
