Owning dogs


There is no one perfect way to care for all dogs because every dog and every situation is different. However, if you really like dogs and are hoping to home one, you should know:

Free flying time is very important for budgies. Try to offer them several hours of free flying time in a bird safe room every day.



Water, food dishes, and the bottom of a budgie's cage need to be cleaned every day. The cage needs to be deep cleaned every week.



Owning rabbits

Most rabbits don't like being picked up. The best way to interact with them is on the floor, where you can pet and stroke them.

Rabbits eat all day long. They need to eat grass or hay to stay healthy, so this something to think about if someone in your house has hay fever.



Rabbits can live indoors or outdoors. Wherever they live, they need lots of space to safely hide, hop, run, stand upright, fully stretch out, and lay down.



Rabbits need a lot of care. Their toilet areas or trays must be cleaned every day.
